VIRTUAL MID-YEAR GENERAL MEETING AND VIRTUAL DIALOGUE WITH THE CHIEF MINISTER

- 9. Frepenca's Mid-Year General Meeting and Dialogue with the Chief Minister were both held virtually on 14 December 2021. Some of the issues raised at the Dialogue with the Chief Minister were as follows:-
 - (a) Talent pool availability:
 - (b) Lifting the freeze on intake of foreign workers for the export-oriented industries;
 - (c) Extension of vaccinated travel lane approach for travel between Singapore and Penang International Airport;
 - (d) Reopening of Malaysia's borders;
 - (e) Reduction in or removal of quarantine time requirement for short business trips;
 - (f) Illegal parking of factory buses and employees' vehicles at Prai FIZ;
 - (g) Proposed direct bus routes to Bayan Lepas FIZ and Non-FIZ by Rapid Penang;

- (h) A large crowd of people from outstation expected to flock to Penang during the coming weekends and year end school holiday;
- (i) Idea of establishing sister city relationship with San Jose, California;

(j) Designated areas for foreign workers' dormitories;

- (k) Covid-19 booster shot needed to maintain fully vaccinated status for those aged 18 and above;
- (I) Road safety issue arising from the reckless factory workers who ride bicycles to and from work on the wrong direction of road and wear dark colour uniforms, resulting in poor visibility during the night and rainy weather;
- (m) Shortage of industrial land in Penang; and
- (n) Update on Penang Transport Master Plan.

CUSTOMS

 The Customs Convenor continued to attend meetings convened by the Customs Department and any new Customs procedures and regulations are then communicated to members.

SECURITY

11. The Security Sub-Committee continues to hold regular meetings to discuss security issues affecting companies in the FIZ.

PENANG MANUFACTURING INDUSTRY ADVISORY COUNCIL ("PMIAC")

12. During the second half year, the President and Vice-President represented Frepenca (a member of PMIAC) to join the Industry Dialogue with the Chief Minister virtually on 24 July 2021. The Dialogue session aimed to provide a platform for the Penang State Government to share its multi-pronged approaches in accelerating the State's recovery and to stay informed on the industry's concerns and feedbacks in the current environment. The President and a member company's representative also joined PMIAC Meeting No. 3 held virtually on 25 August 2021. Subsequent to the PMIAC Meeting No. 3, the Joint Press Statement of PMIAC's Members stating that addressing vaccines and SOP issues are key for industrial sustainability was issued on 27 August 2021.

CEO NETWORKING DINNER

13. Your Committee hosted a Networking Dinner for CEOs at G Hotel Gurney, Penang on 14 December 2021 subsequent to the virtual Mid-Year General Meeting with the objective of bringing together CEOs.

ANNUAL SURVEY

14. Frepenca conducts surveys annually on its member companies in order to obtain data on business trends, headcount of employees, environment, power and water interruptions, traffic congestion affecting members and business impact of Covid-19. Members are encouraged to support these surveys so that more accurate data can be obtained.

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF THE FREE INDUSTRIAL ZONE, PENANG, COMPANIES' ASSOCIATION (FREPENCA)

Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the accounts of The Free Industrial Zone, Penang, Companies' Association (FREPENCA) ("the Association"), which comprise the statement of financial position as at 31 December 2021 and the income and expenditure account for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information, as set out on pages 11 to 14.

In our opinion:-

- (a) The expenditure have been adequately authorised and supported by relevant documents, the expenditure are reasonable and in accordance with the rules and conditions for the use of subscriber funds by the Association for the period from 1 January 2021 to 31 December 2021;
- (b) The financial statement represent fairly, in all material aspects, the income and expenditure accounts of the Association;
- (c) The funds were deposited in a bank account in the name of The Free Industrial Zone, Penang, Companies' Association (FREPENCA);
- (d) No material weaknesses in financial and accounting systems and internal controls were discovered during the course of the audit;
- (e) Receipts and use of the subscriber funds have been properly accounted for; and
- (f) The funds have been used exclusively to cover the Association expenditures.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing [ISAs, including ISA800 (Revised) and 805 (Revised)]. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statement section of our report. We are independent of the Association in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statement in Malaysia, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.



Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements (Cont'd)

Responsibilities of Committee and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statement

The Committee of the Association are responsible for preparation and fair presentation of the financial statement in accordance with the cash receipts and disbursements basis of accounting, this includes determining that the cash receipts and disbursements basis of accounting is an acceptable basis for the preparation of the financial statement in the circumstances, and for such internal control as the Committee determine is necessary to enable the preparation of a financial statement that is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statement, the Committee are responsible for assessing the Association's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters relating to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the Committee either intend to liquidate the Association or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statement

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statement as a whole is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of this financial statement.

As part of an audit in accordance with ISAs, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statement, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit
 procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing
 an opinion on the effectiveness of the Association's internal control.

Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Association to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates, if any, and related disclosures made by the Committee.

BASIS OF PREPARATION

The accounts are prepared solely for the information of the members of The Free Industrial Zone, Penang, Companies' Association (FREPENCA) ("the Association") and in accordance with FREPENCA's accounting policies stated below.

SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(a) Measurement Basis

The accounts are prepared using the historical cost basis unless indicated otherwise in other significant accounting policies.

(b) Receivables

Receivables are carried at the amount expected to be recovered. Known bad debts are written off and specific allowance is made for any debt considered to be doubtful of collection.

(c) Fixed Deposits and Cash At Bank

Fixed deposits and cash at bank are recognised and carried at cost.

(d) Payables and Accruals

Payables and accruals are carried at cost which is the fair value of the consideration to be paid for goods and services.

(e) Revenue Recognition

- (i) Income from subscriptions is recognised on accrual basis.
- (ii) Entrance fees are recognised on receipt basis.
- (iii) Interest on fixed deposit is on accrual basis using the effective interest method.
